Art in a Mediated Landscape: Contemporary Issues of Art and the Environment.

Spring 2015

Professor: Joseph Smolinski

Course Description:

This course is an interdisciplinary course that focuses on contemporary issues of art and the environment. Lectures, readings, and research will provide an overview of the history of cultures and artists working with the land as a medium as well as contemporary artists that address human impacts of the environment.

The course will begin with an overview of ancient sites and geoglyphs from Europe, South America and North America that use the landscape as a medium. These sites will be referenced while studying the works and theories from artists involved with the Land Art movement from the 1960's and 70's such as Robert Smithson, Michael Heizer, and Nancy Holt. From this research students will develop a research paper and collaborative land art projects that engage the campus landscape and community.

The second section of the course will examine contemporary artists whose work reflects notions of the Anthropocene. In response, students will create studio projects that seek to develop new ways of looking at the landscape and encourage interdisciplinary approaches to art making. The course will cumulate with a portfolio of essays and artworks organized in a hand made book project and a student led tour of a researched landscape that engages current environmental issues.
